


Dear Friends,

Though a year has past, in some ways it seems we are back where we found ourselves last December. As I was writing the letter for the December 2020 bulletin the newspapers were filled with headlines like, '3 Weeks to save

Christmas'



A year later and this is the type of headline we are seeing on 29th November. Fear is rising again as we hear of the increasing levels of Covid 19 infections, of hospitals under intense pressure, new lockdowns across Europe and above all the media driven panic at the news of the new 'Omicron Variant.'

Once again fear and uncertainty are in the ascendant as the hope that we were getting out of this pandemic once again fades. A year ago, we were being told that vaccinations

were our way out of this. What happened to that hope? When will this finally end? And where in the mist of all this can true hope be found?

Hope was a rare commodity in the early years of the first century AD in Judea. The Jews had once again lost their independence, this time to the Romans, and Judea was now a province of the Roman Empire. The Jews bitterly resented having to pay taxes to Caesar. Judea was ruled in Rome's name by a

client king known as Herod the Great - certainly his ruthlessness, casual violence and paranoia were very great. Though he ruled over the Jews he was not a Jewish king, His father was by descent an Edomite (a descendent of Jacob's twin brother - Esau) whose ancestors had converted to Judaism. He was king not because of who he was but because of whom he knew in the Roman Emperor's court. He was neither loved nor respected by his Jewish subjects.

What gave the Jews hope in the midst of the gloom and darkness of their present circumstances? It was the hope of what God had promised them, the hope of a Messiah, a king of David's line who would save them. They were eagerly looking towards the fulfilment of that promise and clung to prophecies like that of Isaiah 9:

'The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned... For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Of the greatness of his government and peace there will be no end. He will reign on David's throne and over his kingdom, establishing and upholding it with justice and righteousness from that time on and forever. The zeal of the LORD Almighty will accomplish this.'

And Isaiah 42: "Here is my servant whom I have chosen, the one I love, in whom I delight; I will put my Spirit on him and he will proclaim justice to the nations. He will not quarrel or cry out; no one will hear his voice in the streets. A bruised reed he will not break, and a smouldering wick he will not snuff out, till he has brought justice through to victory. In his name the nations will put their hope."

We want to focus our hearts and minds on the reason for the hope that we have and that hope has a name – it is Jesus Christ. At Christmas we proclaim the message that Jesus is the hope of the world, not governments, not human leaders or princes, not vaccines, nor covid passports, but Jesus.

We want to celebrate the love of God for a fallen world and for lost sinners

that saw him send His only Son into the world to bring light and hope, dispelling our darkness and saving us from the mess that we have got ourselves into.

We will have our usual mix of Christmas services (though still sadly curtailed to some degree by ongoing covid restrictions.) We will have had our Christmas Gift Service on Sunday 5th December, our annual Carols by Candlelight Service will be on 19th December at 6:30pm and this will, of necessity, once again be a hybrid service containing both live and prerecorded elements. There will be family services on Christmas Day and Boxing Day at 10:30am and this year throughout the period of Advent we will be following Matthew's account of events surrounding the nativity.

I'm sure that we all know friends or neighbours who feel weighed down by the constant darkness and gloom we are bombarded with these days - people who are looking for hope. Why not invite them to come and hear the message of Good News about Jesus, the hope of the world. Offer them the light of the gospel to replace the darkness of our society. There is no better Christmas present you could give them than to invite them to hear of the difference that Jesus makes and the sure and certain hope that he offers.

I trust that you will all know a hope-filled Christmas and my prayer for you is, "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."

Christmas 🛕 😇


Our Christmas party evening will be Thursday 16th December. We will then take a break during the holiday season and restart on Thursday 13th January 2022.




Link Summary update

Work is still continuing to progress well, and we have now held our third Link progress meeting.

The main demolition work to the existing Link area has now been completed with the temporary propping underway on the wall areas that need to be retained. It is planned to commence the ground piling work soon which will be followed by structural steel manufacture and erection.

In the minor hall area, the soft strip is well underway, the old kitchen has been stripped out, the hall ceiling lights and the ceiling tiles have also been removed.



In terms of the financial side of the Link Development the first two stage payments to the contractors have been made in line with the contract. We are very grateful for the ongoing generous giving of our church family and with more than £200,000 currently in the Link Development Account we will not need to start using our bank loan facility until well into 2022. We have also had several meetings with potential grant providers and are hopeful of decisions on our applications in the New Year. Thank you for all your ongoing financial support.

UPDATED COVID-19 GUIDELINES



From the Clerk of the General Assembly Rev Trevor Gribben

Dear Colleagues,

I write today following on from our most recent engagement with officials regarding necessary measures to minimise and mitigate risk in relation to Covid-19. As you will be aware, the Northern Ireland Executive has emphasised the need for everyone to take particular care, especially over the current period, so that it will not prove necessary to bring in more stringent restrictions in a few

weeks' time. We have discussed out current mitigations and easements with officials and it has been recognised that PCI, in line with the other main churches, has kept in place some wise mitigations, which though not required in law, are ".... both for the safety and assurance of all who attend services and meetings in PCI congregations and also to help avoid any potential requirement for proof of vaccination to attend church services and meetings, which would be unacceptable to the Church."

However, in light of the current heightened risk of spread of the Covid-19 virus and having consulted with the Moderator and Convener of the General Council, and in line with delegated authority from the General Council, it has been agreed that the following change to the guidance and/or requirements issued on 12th November 2021, should apply to all PCI congregations in Northern Ireland, with immediate effect:

Services of Worship:

During all services of worship in PCI congregations everyone aged 13 and over, apart from those exempted, must continue to wear face coverings on entry and exit **and now also during the entire service**, apart from when leading from the front i.e. face coverings should no longer be removed when seated at a service of worship. This includes funeral services and wedding services, in the latter case the bridal party are exempt, but should be wise in relation to social distancing.

- This slight tightening of restrictions in regard to face coverings, while obviously regrettable, is necessary at this time on the is strong recommendation of health officials, and is now required by PCI.
- This slight tightening of restrictions however does not apply at present to bible study groups and prayer meetings, where because of smaller numbers, face coverings can continue to be removed once seated, apart from when singing.

Please also note the following additional information:

Pastoral Visiting: Additional care should be exercised in pastoral visiting, with necessary precautions taken, especially when visiting with vulnerable people. Indeed, routine pastoral visiting should not be seen as a priority in the incoming weeks, especially visiting that takes a minister, elder or pastoral visitor from one house to another in a short period of time. When visiting in hospitals and care homes, the advice and direction of the relevant people in charge should be sought and followed.
