# Thinking about the Roman Empire?

Men – how often do you think about the Roman Empire? Have any of you been asked that question recently? I have. And if you've heard a larger than

normal number of Roman Empire references lately it's probably not because a TV streaming service is shortly going to take down Ridley Scott's award winning film 'Gladiator' but rather because of a rather hilarious and bizarre TikTok trend where users ask the men in their lives how often they think about the Roman Empire. The hashtag 'roman empire' has been viewed well over a billion times on TikTok. How often do you think about the Roman Empire? The general consensus for men both young and old seems to be surprisingly - an awful lot.

My daughters asked me the question when we were out for my birthday dinner a few weeks ago, "Dad how often do you think about the Roman Empire?" I was one step ahead of them because while I don't follow Tik Tok I know they do and I had already become aware of this trend through other online sources. I said to them, "Everyday," and they collapsed into floods of laughter.

But the honest truth is that I do think about the Roman Empire regularly, probably not everyday but certainly several times a week

and this is why - because at Queen's University I studied the history of Rome from its founding in around 750BC to the collapse and fall of the Western Roman empire in the early 5th Century AD. I find many things happening in our culture and society today remind me of what happened particularly towards the end of the Roman Empire. In fact I see increasingly alarming similarities between the reasons historians give for the collapse of the Roman Empire and what I see happening in the West today. It leaves me in no doubt that you and I are living during the decline and fall of Western civilisation.

And that leads me directly onto my next question for all of you – How often do you think about the return of Jesus

or once a month or less? Or if you are honest maybe you think about the return of Jesus Christ almost as much as you think about the Roman Empire – almost never! And if you do think about the return of Jesus Christ what kind of emotions does that cause you? Excitement? Confusion? Nervousness, fear even?

I find myself thinking more and more about the return of Christ

particularly as I survey the current state of our world and wonder how much longer can this go on? Extreme weather events and earthquakes, war and conflict in many parts of the world, particularly in Ukraine, and then in more recent days the horrific and deeply upsetting events in Israel and Gaza. Add to all this the ongoing assault on the theological and moral foundations of our society by those who say they are 'Progressives.' The world is in a mess and it could drive you to despair were it not for a belief in the return of Jesus Christ.

The truth is only the return of Jesus Christ will bring a solution to the world's problems because the return of Jesus Christ will bring to an end this present age and will usher in His eternal kingdom and the fulfilment of His promise to make all things new. If you join with us on Sunday evenings as we have been studying 2 Peter you will know that the return of Jesus Christ is one of the main themes of that letter.

The return of the Lord Jesus is Good News in a bad news world. It is Good News for creation – Paul says that, "the creation waits in eager expectation for the sons of God to be revealed." (Romans 8:19) Creation is looking forward in hope to the day when it will "be liberated from its bondage to decay and brought into the glorious freedom of the children of God." (Romans 8:21)

It is Good News for those who presently live in war torn lands. They can look forward to the day, "He (the Messiah—Jesus) shall judge between the nations, and shall decide disputes for many peoples; and they shall beat their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore." (Isaiah 2:4)

It is Good News for all of us who go through times of personal suffering and sorrow in this broken world for we are reminded by the apostle Paul, "I consider that our present sufferings are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed in us." (Romans 8:18)

All these things will come about only when the Lord Jesus Christ returns. So once again let me ask how do you feel when you think about the return of Jesus Christ? If you get feelings of deep unease or fear, that could be because you do not yet know Jesus personally as your Saviour and Lord, or because you have become so conformed to the values of this present world which is destined to pass away.

But if you know Jesus as your Lord and Saviour and are living for Him, then a belief in His return should fill us with hope and expectation because it means, to paraphrase the words of Samwise Gamgee in 'The Lord of the Rings', that everything sad is going to become untrue.

In light of His coming, Peter tells us, "You ought to live holy and godly lives as you look forward to the day of God and speed its coming." (2 Peter 11-12) No special event you are really looking forward to comes quickly when all you do is sit around waiting for it. Those special events seem to come more quickly when we keep ourselves active and busy preparing for them. So it is with Jesus' return - as we wait for Him our calling and responsibility is live in expectation of this great day. We are called to be Jesus' witnesses. As his witnesses we have the Good News to share in a bad news world and the return of Jesus Christ is a central part of that message. So let us as individuals and as a church pray for and take the opportunities that are presented to us to share that Good News.





# Samaritan's Purse - Operation Christmas Child

Operation Christmas Child began in the UK in 1990, after Dave

Cooke, a local businessman in Wrexham and his wife Jill felt called to do something in response to the plight of Romanian orphans at the end of the Cold War. Dave's sister Jan, came up with the concept of the shoebox gift as a form of easily transportable 'Christmas stocking' wrapped



The Wales-based shoebox gift project became an official project of Samaritan's Purse in 1995. Every year since, Samaritan's Purse has collected shoebox gifts filled with toys, school supplies, and hygiene items for children around the world. Since 1990, more than 178 million children in more than 150 countries have received an Operation Christmas Child shoebox. The project delivers not only the joy of what, for many kids, is their first gift ever, but also gives them a tangible expression of God's love.

# The Link Gift Day – Sunday 19th November



It hardly seems like a year has passed since we celebrated the opening of our new Link and refurbished Minor Hall. Over that time we have seen the Link become a central hub where so many of our Church family have met to share fellowship and friendship, not

just on a Sunday, but right throughout the week. We have been able to use our new facilities to help the work of some of our mission partners and the wider PCI church family, so ensuring that our premises continue to be a blessing and encouragement to an increasing number of people.

We continue to fund the Link project through a combination of regular monthly giving and two Gift Days each year. This pattern is working well and we are very grateful to our Church family for your continued support. We are currently awaiting the completion of the Project snag list and will then receive the final retention invoice. Once this has been paid we will have a clear picture of exactly how much the project has cost and, we trust, be able to begin to make periodic additional lump sum repayments to reduce the capital balance outstanding on our loan account. This will help us to repay our debt to the Bank as soon as practically possible.

Although the current financial climate remains challenging, we are asking for your generous giving on our Gift Day to ensure that we can continue to meet our monthly repayments and reduce our debt.
