

EXERCISE YOUR VOTE

Dear friends,

It will hardly have escaped your attention that there is a General Election happening soon. Maybe you cannot muster anything like the enthusiasm for this that my former colleague and current



presenter of BBC Radio Ulster Talkback Willam Crawley has. He is positively giddy with excitement! I suspect most of you, like me, are not.

Every fresh election shows an increasing disengagement between the electorate and the political process in our nation. That should trouble us. The reality is as fictional US President Josiah Bartlett said in the West Wing – "Decisions are taken by those who turn up." If we don't turn up or turn out to vote then we cannot complain about the result and if Christians disengage with the democratic process then our nation ends up with the politicians we deserve.

Whilst it is certainly not my place to tell you how to vote I do want to encourage you to ensure that you play your part in the democratic process because that is part of our calling both as citizens and as Christians. We have a biblical mandate to continue to engage with politics by not only exercising our right to vote but using it in a considered and wise way. Yes politics in a broken world can be deeply discouraging at times, but I still believe that voting matters.

Let me share ten reasons why we should get out and vote. In sharing these I want to acknowledge CARE's excellent General Election resources for providing them. You can access their resources here: Home - engaGE24 | A project of CARE.

1. Christians believe that mankind has been created to rule the earth and subdue it. Government is a means by which we steward God's creation.

"God blessed them and said to them, 'Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky and over every living creature that moves on the ground." (Genesis 1:28)

2. When Jesus was asked what the most important commandment was, he said to love God and to love your neighbour. Voting is one way we can work on behalf of those around us.

"One of the teachers of the law came and heard them debating. Noticing that Jesus had given them a good answer, he asked him, 'Of all the commandments, which is the most important?'

'The most important one,' answered Jesus, 'is this: "Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength." The second is this: "Love your neighbour as yourself." There is no commandment greater than these.' (Mark 12:28–34)

3. Even though we may feel like exiles in conflict with the world today, God wants his people to seek the peace and prosperity of our nation.

"Also, seek the peace and prosperity of the city to which I have carried you into exile. Pray to the Lord for it, because if it prospers, you too will prosper." (Jeremiah 29:7)

4. Christians have a special calling to speak up on behalf of the voiceless and the most vulnerable.

'Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves, for the rights of all who are destitute. Speak up and judge fairly; defend the rights of the poor and needy. (Proverbs 31:8–9)

5. We believe that God has revealed to us his good law which helps humans to flourish, and we want to see it reflected in the laws our governments pass.

'The law of the Lord is perfect, refreshing the soul.

The statutes of the Lord are trustworthy, making wise the simple.

The precepts of the Lord are right, giving joy to the heart.

The commands of the Lord are radiant, giving light to the eyes.

The fear of the Lord is pure, enduring for ever.

The decrees of the Lord are firm, and all of them are righteous.

They are more precious than gold, than much pure gold;

they are sweeter than honey, than honey from the honeycomb.

(Psalm 19:7-10)

6. God calls us to submit to the governing authorities who we elect through our votes.

'Let everyone be subject to the governing authorities, for there is no authority except that which God has established. The authorities that exist have been established by God. Consequently, whoever rebels against the authority is rebelling against what God has instituted, and those who do so will bring judgment on themselves. For rulers hold no terror for those who do right, but for those who do wrong. Do you want to be free from fear of the one in authority? Then do what is right and you will be commended ... for the authorities are God's servants, who give their full time to governing. Give to everyone what you owe them: if you owe taxes, pay taxes; if revenue, then revenue; if respect, then respect; if honour, then honour. (Romans 13:1-7)

- 7. The Bible tells us about occasions where leaders have led their people astray; the politicians we elect will shape our nation, and can lead people closer to or away from God.
- 'Those who guide this people mislead them, and those who are guided are led astray.' (Isaiah 9:16)
- 8. Jesus says that we should steward the gifts which God gives us. Many people in history have not had the gift of a voice in a fair, democratic election like we do.

(The Parable of the Talents - Matthew 25:14-30)

9. God will hold us accountable for the actions we do not take, just as He will for those we do take. Not voting is not a neutral act: we are still influencing the outcome, just as if we do vote.

'If anyone, then, knows the good they ought to do and doesn't do it, it is sin for them.' (James 4:17)

10. The Bible shows us that we are to care for our political leaders and to pray for them, so that we might live a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. This is to be our aspiration for the politicians we elect.

"I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and

thanksgiving be made for all people – 2 for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness."
(1 Timothy 2:1–2)



By the time we come to the next bulletin in September we will have a new government and let us remember our Christian responsibility does not end with exercising our vote. We must also commit to praying for our government and our politicians.

General Election aside I do hope that the summer also provides an opportunity for you and your loved ones to enjoy rest and refreshment.


Awards, validated by the University of Durham.

Living in Northern Ireland whilst working in Wales has been a challenge both for me personally and for us as a family. On the other hand, I have really enjoyed my new job. The Church in Wales is a diverse institution with a strong commitment to mission and a desire to see the people of Wales re-engage with the Gospel. The staff team at the College are fantastic and the students on my MA course are all actively engaged in ministry and mission. Most of them are ordinands or priests in the Anglican Church but some are from other denominations and theological traditions.

Another exciting development: from last December, together with a colleague of mine who is a New Testament scholar, I started a new biblical studies podcast called Horizons of Scripture. The podcast is meant to serve as a resource to the wider church and is aimed at people who have an interest in the Bible and want to go into greater depth. It is available on all platforms (Apple podcasts, Spotify, Amazon etc.) as well as on the Youtube channel of St Padarn's Institute. We post new episodes monthly (although taking a short break over the summer) and if you want to listen to it and share it more widely with others, that would be fantastic.

The Link Journey

Ivan Woods - Railway Street's Project Manager for the Link Redevelopment reports:

I'm sure that you will all be pleased to hear that we have now come to the end of the settling in period in the new Link and that all the snags identified have been addressed.

We held our final sign off meeting with Judith Hamilton on the 7th June.



This will now begin the process of the final completion paperwork which will trigger the final invoices and payments. Discussions indicate that this final invoice amount will be slightly under the original tender sum.

This is a marvellous result when we take into consideration all the challenges that we had to address and the additional work that the contractor undertook.

Our journey first began when a Link Development Team was set up in April 2016. Numerous discussions and meetings followed to define the requirements and establish the cost estimates. Initial plans were drawn up and given Congregational and Dromore Presbytery approval at the end of 2018.

In early 2019 the first Gift Day was held, also discussions were held with the bank to ensure that we had sufficient funds and loan provisions to proceed.

The planning application was prepared and submitted during June 2019.



This approval process took a year, as approval was only granted in June 2020. This approval was granted with conditions but it also came during Covid restrictions. In September 2020 as Covid restrictions started to lift a meeting was held with our

architect Judith Hamilton to discuss and plan the way forward.

During the period from October to December 2020 we identified within our congregation some talented individuals and established some small teams to deal with specific issues relating to the redevelopment such as audio/visual and IT requirements, decor and furnishings and kitchen design.

This was in order to ensure that we were planning a building for the future, that we could all be proud of, while still managing and maintaining control of the costs. Various engineering and consulting teams were also engaged during this period, as well as the drawing packages being prepared and agreed.

In early 2021 the Bill of Quantities was developed, also a list of suitable contractors was drawn up. By April 2021 we were in a position to go out to tender. The tenders were returned in May and the tender submitted by Lowry Construction, which was the lowest, was selected.

This was then discussed and approved at a Congregational Committee meeting at the end of May 2021.

During May and June a church team cleared out everything from the old Link with some interesting discussions about what needed to be stored or disposed of! In August a Lowry's team with their equipment arrived on site. From August until the end of the year this team stripped out and demolished the old building. This was not an easy task, as heritage requirements contained within our planning approval meant that we had to prop up and retain an existing wall, further complicated by the poor ground conditions which were identified during the ground survey making it necessary to have piling carried out in the area prior to the foundations being laid.

As we entered 2022 things started to get exciting, as we started to see the steelwork and then the block work rising. Then the roof went up and the glass was installed. Finally the internal structure including the stairs and the lift were completed. Our grand new building was coming together along with a new kitchen, coffee dock and modern new furnishings.

After 14 site meetings and numerous engineering, technical and all sorts of meetings, site visits, conference and Zoom calls, the construction work was finally completed and the building was handed over to us on 19th October 2022.

It was at this point that as a congregation we began to use our lovely new premises and entered into a settling in period where we could identify and address any problems or concerns.

This was a complicated project with numerous challenges,

involving a lot of people, but everyone worked together very well together to sort out and address problems as they arose.

I would like to thank everyone for their patience, help and support over this period as we worked through this project.
