#### Fallible leaders – but an infallible God!

Against all the odds Donald
Trump is back and looks likely
to be inaugurated as the 47th
president of the United States
on 20th January 2025. This is
either the saving of America
and the Western World or the
end of civilisation as we know
it - depending on your political
perspective! I am just glad that I
was not an American citizen who
faced the unenviable position of
having to choose between Donald
Trump and Kamala Harris.



Politicians make big promises before they get elected and inevitably fail to keep them afterwards. Donald has been elected on the promise to 'Make America Great Again,' and if you listened to his victory speech you will have heard him promise that everything wrong in America will be fixed and everyone will enjoy prosperity as the United States enters a new golden age under his leadership.

How will that look in four years time when President Trump comes to the end of his second term? While he may be successful in some things the reality is that he will have failed to keep many of his promises.

As Christians we don't make the mistake of putting our faith in politicians because we know that always leads to disappointment. The Psalmist says, "Do not put your trust in princes, in human beings, who cannot save. When their spirit departs, they return to the ground; on that very day their plans come to nothing." (Psalm 146:3-4)

Rather as believers in a sovereign God we are to be those, "whose help is the God of Jacob, whose hope is in the LORD their God." (Psalm 146:5)

While human leaders will always fail and disappoint us our belief in a sovereign God reminds us that God can use even Donald Trump to accomplish His divine purposes. Don't get me wrong - personally I think Trump has a number of significant character flaws. But amazingly God can still work through such people to achieve His purposes. History teaches us He has done it before.

In the sixth century BC the Jews found themselves in exile in Babylon under the rule of an egotistical, immoral and narcissist ruler called Nebuchadnezzar. He made a statue of gold (quite possibly in his own image) ninety feet high and nine feet wide to set it up on the plain of Dura in the province of Babylon and commanded everyone to bow down and worship it. Three young Jewish exiles serving in the king's palace refused and were thrown into the fiery furnace. God protected and preserved Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego and humbled Nebuchadnezzar who said, "Praise be to the God of Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, who has sent his angel and rescued his servants! They trusted in him and defied the king's command and were willing to give up their lives rather than serve or worship any god except their own God." (Daniel 3:28) God caused these young men and their fellow exile Daniel to continue to prosper and rise in power even while living in exile.

The prophet Jeremiah had said that the exile in Babylon would last 70 years and then God would see to it that his people could return home. How did this happen? Again it was as a result of God working through another pagan ruler. In 2 Chronicles 36 we read, "In the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, in order to fulfil the word of the LORD spoken by Jeremiah, the LORD moved the heart of Cyrus king of Persia to make a proclamation throughout his realm

and also to put it in writing: "This is what Cyrus king of Persia says: "The LORD, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth and he has appointed me to build a temple for him at Jerusalem in Judah. Any of his people among you may go up, and may the LORD their God be with them."

The sovereign God again worked through an unbelieving ruler to fulfil His promises and accomplish His purposes.

We see it again in the Christmas story. As we have seen in our studies in the Old Testament book of Micah, God said that the promised Saviour, the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem. "But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times." (Micah 5:2)

The problem was that the young woman Mary, who was carrying the promised child, lived in Nazareth far to the north of Bethlehem. How could Micah's prophecy be fulfilled?

God again worked through an unbelieving ruler to accomplish his purposes,



"In those days Caesar
Augustus issued a decree
that a census should be
taken of the entire Roman
world... And everyone went
to their own town to register.
So Joseph also went up
from the town of Nazareth

in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son." (Luke 2:1-7)

We do not put our trust in princes, in mortal men who cannot save. Instead we worship the sovereign God who can still work through these rulers to accomplish His purposes. We worship the God

who provided the divine Saviour we needed.

It was an unlikely Saviour to be sure - one who did not possess the appearance and trappings of worldly power but



one who was wrapped in swaddling clothes and laid in a manger. But this unlikely child would grow to be the Saviour we needed and in God's sovereign purposes, "at just the right time, when we were still powerless, Christ died for the ungodly." (Romans 5:6)

As we approach another Christmas in what appears to be a chaotic and out of control world we celebrate the fact that we have sovereign God who is in control. He works all things and He can work through all people to achieve His purposes.

So let us join together to worship that God and to praise and proclaim the one true Saviour He sent - Christ the Lord. And may we enter 2025 not as others, with fear and foreboding, but with faith in a sovereign God and confident in Christ our Saviour.

While the abuse was before he was archbishop, Justin knew of the cover-up, failed to seek justice and protect victims, and thus accepted his personal and institutional responsibility.

Andy and Rebecca were both very involved in the Link Redevelopment Project and we are delighted that they have agreed to serve our church family in this way.

#### Finance update

Significant one-off receipts in the first half of the year have returned our main account to a credit balance position, along with a marginal increase in FWO this year so far. The end of the church year normally shows increased giving to the FWO which will help towards an on-going breakeven position, although costs are still creeping upwards with salaries and payments to PCI up by inflation and energy costs remaining at higher levels than a few years ago. The finalised position will be presented to the Church Committee in February as normal.

Of course, we cannot rely on ad hoc offerings, and it is essential that on-going regular giving is maintained and regularly reviewed - I noted at the last Committee meeting that if 200 families gave just an extra £40 per year (roughly the price of a cup of coffee each month!), then this would generate £10,000 pa with Gift Aid and would create an annual surplus, easing pressures on the main bank account.

We are, of course, aware of the number of asks on members wallets especially at this time of year and continue to be grateful for the generosity to the various appeals.

Congregational giving for Harvest totalled £3,335 this year and United Appeal continues to exceed our annual Target. At the time of writing, £11,185 has already been raised and should easily pass the £12,345 target set for the 2024 year.

Finally, repayments to the Link Loan Account continue to be met from regular giving and the bi-annual gift days in May and November.
