

Three Words That Mean The Difference Between Life and Death

I have been thinking recently about the three words that mean the difference between life and death. I wonder do you know what they are?

Let me give you a clue - they come from the earliest Christian Confession. Do you know what the oldest or the earliest Christian Confession is?



The earliest Christian Confession goes back to the New Testament and is just three words - 'Jesus is Lord.' This confession is found throughout the New Testament in places such as 1 Corinthians 12:3 "Therefore I want you to know that no one who is speaking by the Spirit of God says, "Jesus be cursed," and no one can say, "Jesus is Lord," except by the Holy Spirit.

We saw it most recently in our studies in Romans - chapter 10 verse 9, "If you

declare with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved."

In making this confession the early Christians said a great deal about the identity of Jesus Christ. In the Old Testament God revealed himself to Moses using a name containing 4 Hebrew letters, equivalent to YHWH in English. It is normally rendered as Yahweh - the name for the covenant God of Israel. This name in the Old Testament is translated into English as LORD with small capital letters. When the Hebrew of the Old Testament was translated into Greek nearly all the occurrences of Yahweh, over

6000 of them, were rendered with the Greek word for Lord - kurios. So to say Jesus is Lord is not just to call Jesus Master it is to affirm that he is fully and completely God. 'Jesus is Lord' - these three words are literally the difference between life and death for only those who confess, 'Jesus is Lord' will be saved.

As we have seen in Romans this was where the Jews who rejected the Gospel fell - the majority of them could not bring themselves to confess that, 'Jesus is Lord,' - that he was God come in human flesh. Instead they continued to try and earn their salvation through their futile attempts to obey the Law. Their failure to acknowledge Jesus as Lord saw them fail to receive salvation and it led to death and judgement.

Yet for both those Jews who did accept Jesus and those Gentiles who responded to the Gospel, to affirm 'Jesus is Lord' led to salvation and eternal life.

But for both Jewish and Gentile believers in 1st century Rome to say, 'Jesus is Lord' increasingly became a matter of life and death for as we saw in our studies in the early chapters of Revelation this was a courageous and dangerous

confession of faith at a time when the Roman emperors declared themselves to be Lord and demanded that all their subjects acknowledge that. This the Christians would not do. This was seen as treason against the emperor and for many of them persecution and matyrdom became the cost of saying, 'Jesus is Lord.'

That continues to be the case in 2025. These three words are still the difference between life and death. To stand up today in North Korea or Iran or Somalia and many other countries on the https://www.opendoorsuk.org/persecution/world-watch-list/ and to affirm Jesus is Lord brings a heavy cost. It still brings persecution, imprisonment or death.

Muslims believe God is one and has no son - Jesus is no more than a prophet but subservient to the one they call Mohammed.

For totalitarian rulers like Kim Jung Un in North Korea you must acknowledge him and his father and grandfather as Lord.



Many of our brothers and sisters are paying the price of that simple confession, 'Jesus is Lord' and we need to continue to uphold and support them in prayer.

But increasingly in our own society to say, 'Jesus is Lord' carries a cost. A few weeks ago we heard from Callum Webster the NI Rep for The Christian Institute (https://

www.christian.org.uk/) about how our religious liberties are under increasing threat in the UK today. To say, 'Jesus is Lord' and to remain faithful to the truth of the scriptures which he inspired will increasingly find us on the wrong side of our secular 'progressive' rulers and society.

Can you say that 'Jesus is Lord?' and are you prepared to pay the price that can come with that confession of faith? Are we prepared to stand with and support those for whom that confession costs the most?

This Easter we will once again hold our Easter Services and reflect on the events that prove Jesus is Lord - his death for our sins on the cross and his glorious resurrection on that first Easter morning. I hope you will join with us and I pray that it would be the case that there might be those who make that confession, 'Jesus is Lord' for the first time.

These are three of the most important words in the world - they are quite literally the difference between life and death.

Finance update February 2025

You will recall a worrying £31,000 deficit in our 2022 accounts which was significantly reduced by an increase in our Free Will Offering but still left our Church's expenditure exceeding our income by £10,000 in 2023 and pushing the main bank account nearly £20,000 "into the red" at the end of that year.



It had been hoped that FWO would continue to increase in 2024 but final figures show the contributions at an almost identical level to the previous (albeit improved) year. Indeed, had it not been for significant one-off receipts from Bequests and other one off income amounts, the situation at the end of 2024 would have been much more concerning.

On the face of it, the £25,000 in year surplus reported to the Church Committee at its February meeting has returned the main bank account to a modest positive figure of around £5,000. Nevertheless, without the benefit of one-off Bequests etc. there will likely be a further in year deficit for 2025 in the region of £10,000 to £15,000 unless we see an improvement in our FWO income.

We are very grateful for the FWO giving from all of our contributing families, whether part of our church for many years or having joined us recently.

However, it is worth noting that a modest increase in giving of £4 per month from each of our 250 contributing families would, when Gift Aid is added, generate the £15,000 we need to address our projected shortfall and return our operating account to a surplus of income over expenditure for the year.

On that note, if any one needs a FWO number or wishes to sign up for Gift Aid (so that HMRC will add 25% to your offering at no cost to the individual) please contact myself or any of the team. The bank details for the Church to enable you to set up Standing Orders for regular payments are included at the end of this summary for your convenience.

On a positive note, Congregational giving for others remains strong with some £13,556.75 paid over to the PCI United Appeal and comfortably meeting our annual target for 2024. Again, I am confident our 2025 target of £12,975 will be comfortably met.

Final Bills for the Link project have now all been received with the construction costs coming in around $\mathfrak{L}5,000$ below the agreed Tender of $\mathfrak{L}948,000$. The Church Committee were also presented with the overall costs of the total build to include professional fees, furniture, kitchen equipment and the recently completed refurbishing of the wooden floor in the minor hall, which totalled $\mathfrak{L}1.159m$ when everything is taken into account.

Set against the outstanding balance on the Bank Loan of £578,000, this means at the start of 2025, we have paid approximately half of the total costs of the Link Project as we continue to repay £6,300 monthly on the Loan as funded by our Gift Days in May and November.

One final bill is due to the contractors in the sum of £39,000, which is more than the credit balance currently available in the property account. High interest rates necessitate £6,300 being found for the monthly repayment on the bank loan and so the next Gift Day on 18 May will need to raise over £40,000 (including Gift Aid) to repay the contractor and maintain the loan repayments - for context the Gift Days in 2024 raised (with Gift Aid) around £26,000 last May and £29,000 in November. The contractor worked well with us throughout the build and it would be good to clear the final outstanding amount to them as soon as possible.

You can give to the Link "Gift Day" using the special envelopes that

will be available. Please make any cheques payable to "Railway Street Presbyterian Church" and, if you are a tax payer, remember to include your name, address and FWO number so that the church can claim Gift Aid of 25% on your gift.

You can also give to the "Gift Day" by bank transfer to the Property Account.

Overall, we are heading in the right direction, but given continuing inflation and pay pressures through increased National Insurance costs coupled with interest rates reducing more slowly than we would have hoped, our regular giving remains our main source of income. As I said above, for little more than the price of a cup of coffee a month we could generate an "in year" surplus if everyone was to commit to giving a little extra on a regular basis.

Our sincere thanks goes out to all who continue to respond so positively to the needs of our Church, and of others, in these difficult economic times.


BB Awards Night
