Confidence in the Face of Chaos

They say it is an ancient Chinese curse - 'May you live in interesting times.' It is used ironically to wish someone misfortune, implying that 'interesting times' are typically times of trouble. No one can doubt that we live in interesting times - times of trouble - times of chaos and conflict.

There is ongoing conflict in the Middle East between Iran, the USA and Israel.

In addition, there is ongoing war in Ukraine and Sudan and elsewhere. Then there is the effect that all this is having on the cost of living. Plus there are all the challenges facing our nation in terms of the economy, taxation, immigration and defence and a Prime Minister and government who seem increasingly incapable of rising to these challenges.

At the time of writing Sir Keir Starmer is still Prime Minister - but who knows if this will still be the case at the time of publication.

These are turbulent times, uncertain times, frightening times. In such times it is important to remind ourselves where we find confidence in the face of so much chaos.

The Psalms are good for doing this. First of all we are reminded of where we should not place our confidence. 'Do not put your trust

in princes, in human beings, who cannot save.’ (Psalm 146:3)

Our leaders are sinners just like us. They are weak and fallible and increasingly they rely on human wisdom rather than seeking God’s wisdom. There is no help to be found here.

Increasingly they are the cause of the chaos rather than the cure.

Where is our confidence to be found and in whom should we put our trust? Psalm 146 goes on to say, ‘Blessed are those whose help is the God of Jacob, whose hope is in the LORD their God.’ (Psalm 146:5)

Still your heart, take a deep breath and then slowly read the words of Psalm 47 and allow it to give us the heavenly perspective on the apparent chaos we see on earth,



‘Clap your hands, all you nations;
shout to God with cries of joy.

For the LORD Most High is awesome,
the great King over all the earth.

He subdued nations under us,
peoples under our feet.

He chose our inheritance for us,
the pride of Jacob, whom he loved.

God has ascended amid shouts of joy,
the LORD amid the sounding of trumpets.

Sing praises to God, sing praises;
sing praises to our King, sing praises.
For God is the King of all the earth;
sing to him a psalm of praise.
God reigns over the nations;
God is seated on his holy throne.
The nobles of the nations assemble
as the people of the God of Abraham,
for the kings of the earth belong to God;
He is greatly exalted.'

We need to focus our eyes beyond and above the chaos and find fresh confidence in the God who still reigns and who has exalted His son Jesus as Lord of all.

It is all too easy to despair at the state of our nation and world and to criticise our leaders. The Bible again offers us a different perspective. Paul reminds us that ultimately 'the authorities are God's servants, who give their full time to governing.' (Romans 13:6) They will answer to God for how they discharge the responsibility entrusted to them.

Our calling as God's people is to pray for them in the challenging task God has given them. Paul writes to his friend Timothy and the church in Ephesus, 'I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people - for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness.' (1 Timothy 1:1-2)

Let me tell you where else I find fresh confidence and renewed

perspective - it is as I join together with God's people in Railway Street each Lord's Day to praise His name and to hear His Word.



During May we will continue to study John's Gospel as we fix our eyes on Jesus. Then having reached the halfway point of that Gospel we will take a break from it and in June, God willing, we will begin a short

series on looking at our call to serve in Jesus' church particularly in light of the fact that we will be electing a new Congregational Committee in September.

I would encourage you to join with us and find fresh confidence in the face of chaos and together let us, 'Sing praises to God, sing praise sing praises to our King ... For God is the King of all the earth.' (Psalm 47:6-7)

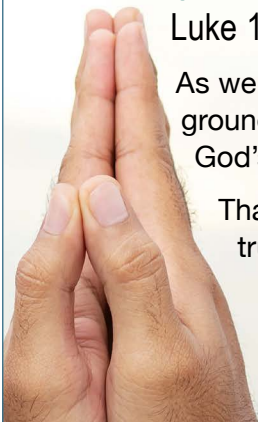

It has been another enjoyable and blessed year for our company and we give thanks to the Lord Jesus Christ - the captain of our salvation - for it.

We also say a huge thank you to our captain David Cleland and superb team of leaders for their commitment and service.



Safeguarding Update

I wanted to take this opportunity to provide an update on what has been happening regarding Safeguarding across our denomination over the first part of this year. This has been a very challenging time but I believe we are now seeing positive, tangible progress to address the issues we face.

Following the events of November 2025, The Very Rev Dr Richard Murray returned as Moderator of the General Assembly on 1 December and called two Special General Assembly meetings, one on 18 December 2025 and a second on 18 February 2026. As well as providing opportunities for repentance and reflection, these Assemblies agreed a number of changes to the governance structures at the centre of our denomination, particularly the creation of a tripartite leadership made up of the Clerk and Deputy Clerk of the General Assembly and a new post - Director of Operations. These roles form the senior leadership team of the Church and have clear lines of reporting and accountability to the General Council and General Assembly.

The Northern Ireland Charity Commission (NICC) announced a statutory enquiry and the PSNI opened an investigation into the Safeguarding failings within our Church last December. As part of this, the Church is required to appoint an independent external panel to undertake a review of Safeguarding. The membership and terms of reference for this independent panel had to be agreed with both the NICC and PSNI. The PCI Statutory Investigations Task Group (of which I am a member) worked through most of the first quarter of the year to set this in place. This is no small task given the scope



of the work involved, the need to find those qualified to undertake it and the highly confidential nature of the process in bringing this all together. It is most unfortunate that a small number of individuals, to further their own ends, decided to use the press and social media to fill this period of public silence by the Church with uninformed commentary and unhelpful speculation.

Following approval from both the NICC and PSNI, the Moderator announced on 27 March that the INEQE Safeguarding Group would undertake the independent review of PCI Safeguarding. The review will be led by Jim Gamble QPM with the terms of reference covering:

- Governance, Accountability and Oversight
- Personnel Suitability and Skills
- Policy and Operational Practice.

The review has begun and it is expected that it will be completed, with the publication of the findings and all learnings that come from them, early in 2027. New Safeguarding policies and procedures have been approved and these will be rolled out, together with training and support, over coming months. Information is available on our church website and the PCI website so please refer to this and ask about anything that you would like additional information on.

On a personal note, I would like to thank our church family for your prayers, support and encouragement over the first quarter of the year when the Statutory Investigations Task Group work was at its most intense and often felt almost overwhelming. Your care for me reinforced what a privilege and blessing it is to be member of our fellowship.

Finance Update and Gift Day May 2026



Recent improvements in our finances, particularly in the second half of 2025, have continued into the start of 2026 and may well lead to a “break-even” position for the incoming year, although continuing inflation particularly on our energy costs will likely effect the overall outcome as the ongoing conflicts in the Middle East continue. As always we are grateful for the FWO giving from all of our contributing families, whether part of our church for many years or having joined us recently, and to those who have already increased their regular giving in recent months. The Bank Details for the Church Accounts, to enable you to set up Standing Orders for regular payments, are included at the end of this summary for your convenience.

As we approach our next Gift Day on the 17 May, I am pleased to report the Property account is now in a healthier position having cleared all the contractor’s fees and has been able to cover costs such as repairs to our buildings following the winter storms and eradicating woodworm in the organ. The bi-annual Gift Day has so far been very successful in achieving funds to meet the monthly repayments on the Loan Account which are currently just shy of £6,000 per month; although any future reductions in interest rates would reduce this figure.



You can give to the Link “Gift Day” using the special envelopes that will be available. Please make any cheques payable to “Railway Street Presbyterian Church” and, if you are a tax payer, remember to include your name, address and FWO number so that the church can claim Gift Aid of 25% on your gift.

You can also give to the “Gift Day” by bank transfer to the Property Account.

FWO and United Appeal giving is via the main bank account (details below). The 2026 target for United Appeal has increased to £13,375 but we remain on course to meet this again as we have done consistently in the past.

Following Christ, Serving the Community

Revision of Elders' Districts

Our church family, along with more than 500 others across the whole island of Ireland, is part of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. This means that each local Presbyterian church is governed by a Kirk Session which is made up of the Teaching Elder (Minister) and a number of Ruling Elders. The Kirk Session has a number of responsibilities, including spiritual oversight of, and pastoral care for, the church family.

One of the ways that elders take responsibility for pastoral care in Railway Street is through the allocation of an elder to a specific group of people or organisation, part of the ministry of the church or to those who belong to our church who live in a particular area (a district). In Railway Street, each district is assigned a Ruling Elder to ensure that those in that district receive appropriate pastoral care. It is important to remember that there is not a 'one size fits all' approach to pastoral care with a regular personal visit being best for some while other options, such as a periodic phone call or occasional catch up over coffee, are better for others.

The Kirk Session reviews the size and allocation of elders' districts periodically to ensure that our pastoral care is as effective as it can be. We decided to do that this year as our church family has changed considerably since the last review was completed in 2021.

The elders' districts have been revised and, from April 2026, are as follows.

If your elder is changing, your new and former elders will agree between them how best to make this change for you.

In addition to these districts, Kirk Session appointed Charlie Hadjiev as the elder responsible for pastoral care for our young people studying away from home at University in Great Britain. We are grateful to Charlie for using his experience working in tertiary education, as well as with the International Fellowship of Evangelical Students (IFES), to help support these members of our church family.

Election of new Congregational Committee

In the Presbyterian system of church government, the spiritual affairs of the local congregation are managed by the Kirk Session and the church finances and property are managed by the Congregational Committee.

Periodically the qualified voting members of the local congregation elect Ruling Elders who are ordained and installed to their role by the local Presbytery.

Elections for membership of the Congregational Committee are normally held every three years, with the last election in our congregation having been in early 2023. As a result, we are due to hold an election for a new Congregational Committee this year and want to express our thanks to our outgoing Committee for their faithfulness in undertaking their responsibilities.

In Paragraph 61, the Code (the constitution and governance document of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland) sets out two options for electing a Congregational Committee. Kirk Session considered these two options at our meeting in March this year

and agreed that we would use Option 2 for our forthcoming committee election.

Under this Option, a list of qualified voting members will be drawn up and published. A qualified voting member is a communicant member of the congregation who has contributed to Freewill Offering during the previous financial year. Any new Communicant member who has joined and contributed to Freewill Offering during the current financial year is also a qualified voting member. It is intended that the qualified voter list will be drawn up and published by 7 June 2026. Members of the congregation then have two weeks to make any objections to those included on, or omitted from, the qualified voters list. These objections must be made in writing to the Minister. Assuming all goes as planned, the qualifying voters list will be finalised and approved by 28 June.

On the first two Sundays of September, it will be announced to the congregation that an election to the Congregational Committee will take place. In this announcement, qualified voters are asked to propose, in writing to the Session Clerk, names of qualified voters for consideration by the Kirk Session as members of the congregational committee. All qualified voters so nominated will be considered by Kirk Session, regardless of the number of times a qualified voter is proposed. Thus, a person nominated by two qualified voters will be considered on the same basis as a person nominated by fifty qualified voters.

At its meeting on 14 September, Kirk Session will prepare a list of up to 20 qualified voters who have been duly nominated and have agreed to allow their name to go forward to the congregation. This list will be read to the congregation on

20 and 27 September. After morning worship on 4 October, a congregational meeting will be held. At this meeting, a poll of the qualified voters attending shall be taken by secret ballot in respect of each person on the list, who shall be deemed elected if two-thirds of those who vote are in favour of them. It is planned that we will have a congregational lunch that Sunday to allow the votes to be counted and the result announced to those present. The result will then be announced again the following Sunday (11 October) and the new Congregational Committee will hold its initial meeting on 12 October.

We believe that using this option provides our congregation with the best way of ensuring that we have a Committee elected with the blend of necessary skill and experience across the range of areas that we need. These areas include financial management, accounting, civil engineering, mechanical engineering, information technology, project management, health & safety, practical property maintenance and general business administration. We are very fortunate that we have people within our church family who not only have the desired skills and experience but are willing to use them in the work of God's Kingdom in Railway Street.

Our Minister intends to preach a short series of sermons on electing the Congregational Committee in June and I am happy to answer any questions you have on the election process. We ask that all our members remember this election process in prayer asking that God will raise up the people of His choosing to serve on our new Congregational Committee.

Wexford minister says ‘thank you’

Rev David Curran, who is leading a special project of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland (PCI), to reimagine its ministry to Wexford town and the surrounding area, has thanked everyone who came to last Wednesday’s Service of Thanksgiving and Dedication. The special service was held to mark a fresh start for the old Presbyterian Church building on Anne Street.

“We had a great night, and I think we had nearly 60 people come along, including colleagues from different denominations, and I would like to thank everyone who took the time to be there. For some it isn’t always easy to walk in to a place of worship for the first time, but for those who did, I hope they found a warm welcome, and we will see them again.

“The Service marked the end of the beginning really. With the refurbishment completed making the place more people friendly, we are now properly open for business. I preached on Matthew 11, which I thought would be an appropriate message, when Jesus invited people to come to him. Matthew records Jesus saying, “Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light.’

“It paints a beautiful picture of Jesus with his arms open wide, welcoming people to himself. We are called to imitate Jesus,



and this is the kind of church we want to be. No hiding behind the gates, a place that is part of the community and serves the community, as we preach the Gospel in word and deed.”

Built in 1840, for over 180 years Wexford Presbyterian Church served the Presbyterian family in the town, and surrounding area, as the only Presbyterian church in the county, closing in 2023. In September 2024 one of PCI’s central councils, the Council for Mission in Ireland, appointed Rev Curran to lead the Wexford Presbyterian Development project to develop a fresh vision and a new way of doing ‘church’ in the town.



Talking about the future, Rev David Curran said that the challenge now was to live up to the things that they said they would do. “It is exciting and challenging at the same time. Having rededicated the building to the service of God and the people of Wexford, the work really begins in earnest. We have our Sunday Service at 10.30am and a Bible study at the Manse on a Thursday evening. Shortly, we will also be starting a course called Christianity Explored.

“It will be open to everyone and really does what it says on the tin, as it helps people find out more about what Christianity is all about. It is for the kind of person I was speaking to on Wednesday evening, who was wondering out loud if there was more to life than they were experiencing. The simple answer to that is that with Jesus, the answer is ‘yes!’”
